Make Your Plans to Vote.

Election Day is Tuesday, November 3<sup>rd</sup>. How will you cast your ballot?

Show up at your polling place on Election Day. Greenhouse Village residents vote at Roseville Lutheran Church, 1215 Roselawn Ave. W.

Absentee Ballot. Covid-19 will still be with us on Election Day. If you are concerned about waiting in line with a large group of people for what could be a couple of hours you can request an Absentee Ballot be mailed to you by going to the website Mnvotes.org or by calling Ramsey County Elections Office at 651-266-2171.

The ballot will be mailed to you (beginning Sept. 18th). Fill it out following the directions exactly! You will be placing it in 3 separate envelopes, you do not need a witness' signature. Place it in the mail box as soon as you have it filled out, preferably 1 to 2 weeks before Election Day. It needs to be postmarked on or before Nov. 3rd but can be received up until Nov. 11th. You can track your ballot at the Mnvotes.org website and see if it was received. A letter to the editor at the Star Tribune indicated that the biggest problem with mail-in ballots is the incorrect usage of the three envelopes. The purpose of the exact envelope is so that your ballot does not identify you as the voter.

**Early Voting.** Voters may also vote in person from Sept. 18<sup>th</sup> to Nov. 2<sup>nd</sup>, at the Ramsey County Library, 2180 Hamline Ave. N. Additional early voting sites will be

available from Oct. 27<sup>th</sup> to Nov. 2<sup>nd</sup>. Contact Ramsey County Elections at 651-266-2171 or go to <u>elections@co.ramsey.mn.us</u> for information.

Have you updated your voter registration since moving to Greenhouse Village? This can be done by going to the Mnvotes.org website. It needs to be done before Oct. 13<sup>th</sup>, the close of pre-registration. After that date you may register to vote at the polling place on election day.

#### **Humidifiers**

A Humidifier is a device to increase the humidity in the air and should be used with a humidstat to measure the humidity in a room. If you have asthma or suffer an occasional nosebleed, you need to consider a humidifier in your unit. More information can be found at:

https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Humidifier, or just doing a google search for humidifier. There are basically these 3 types of humidifiers in use here at GVC:

### 1. Evaporative

The most common portable humidifier, an "evaporative", "cool moisture", or "wick humidifier", consists of just a few basic parts: a reservoir, wick (filter media) and fan.

The wick is made of a porous material that absorbs water from the reservoir and provides a larger surface area from which the water evaporates. The fan is adjacent to the wick and blows air onto the wick to aid in the evaporation of the water.

The wick or filter needs to be changed at least monthly. A humidifier with control of fan speed, humidity level and water level will also have a control to indicate when the filter should be replaced. This is the recommended type for use in GVC, as other types tend to produce a white dust which clogs the air filter on the furnace. Our experience is that it takes about 1 gallon of water a day to keep the air in the bedroom at 45 to 50% relative humidity. Under normal conditions, tap water should work just fine as long as heat or ultrasonics are not used.

In doing research for this article, I found over 300 different models. If anyone is looking for a unit, Robert or I would be available to answer questions.

### 2. Vaporizer

A vaporizer (steam humidifier, warm mist humidifier) heats or boils water, releasing steam and moisture into the air. A medicated inhalant can also be added to the steam vapor to help reduce coughs. These are designed for medical purposes to aid in cold and flu suffering but they should not be used to increase the humidity in the unit as a general implement.

### 3. Ultrasonic (These should not be used at GVC)

An ultrasonic humidifier uses a ceramic diaphragm vibrating at an ultrasonic frequency to create water droplets that silently exit the humidifier in the form of cool fog. This type must be used with distilled water to eliminate the white dust problem which clogs the furnace filter.

### The Bathroom Fan Control

The bathroom fan is designed to remove humidity caused by the shower or bath. There is a wall switch to turn it on or off and a humidistat control above the switch that will also turn it on or off depending upon the settings. The bathroom fan is used to remove moisture and to prevent the buildup of mold. It has a dial and a control knob that goes counter clock wise to the highest humidity number and clock wise to the lowest number. The numbers range from 80 to 20. I find that if I set the knob to 70 in the summer, the fan will start up if I turn on the shower and it will turn off again after about ½ hour after I finished. In the winter, I usually set the knob to 40 or 45. I use the wall switch to turn on the fan when I shower and then turn the wall switch off when I finish. The fan will run until it reaches the humidity level that I set.
